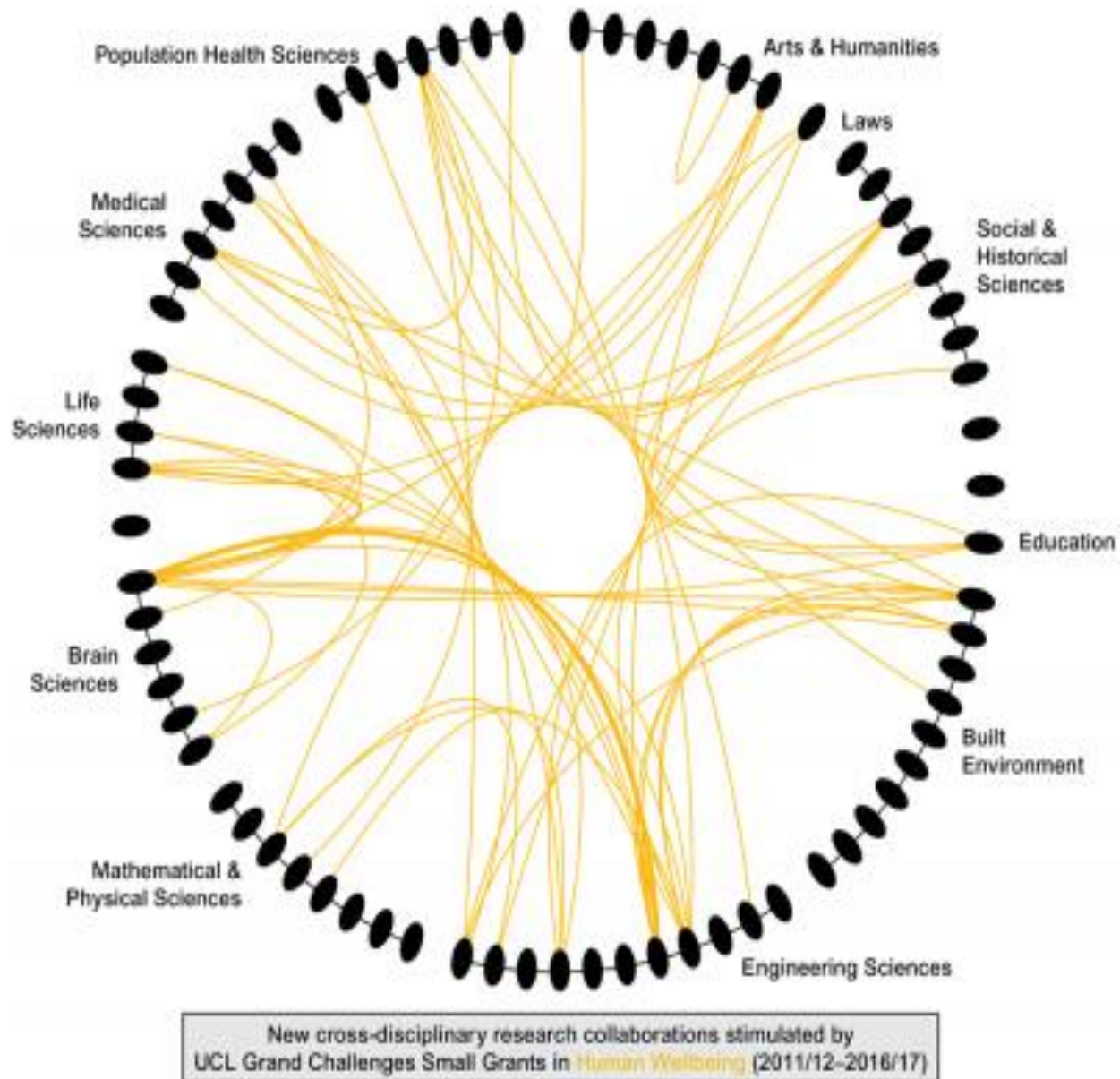
## UCL Grand Challenges: the Global University

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# RecommendME: Grand Challenge of Human Wellbeing

**The 2013 winning project**, developed by a team of researchers from disciplines across UCL, **was a digital platform called RecommendME**. It targets and tailors **services to support healthy ageing**, providing a unique solution to social isolation and physical inactivity amongst older adults.

The project now has an active partnership with a huge breath of organisations, such as AgeUK, Camden Council, Holborn Community Centre and OurCamden, gives it an advantage over other standalone wellbeing apps. It has secured additional research funding and there is likely to be further policy stakeholder engagement and policy-focused activity from this exciting initiative.

The project also secured £70,000 of additional funding from the Ageing Better in Camden network.

# UCL Legal Advice Clinic (UCL LAC)

Launched in January 2016 by the UCL Faculty of Laws, UCL LAC has expanded the Faculty's research-based teaching and learning programmes through the **provision of free legal advice and assistance** in UCL Laws' own advice clinic based in Newham, London.

The UCL LAC is singular in its **integration of a student legal advice clinic into a health centre** co-located with a GP practice allowing students to gain a **unique perspective on solving legal problems and improving wellbeing**.

# Pain: Speaking the threshold

[A Grand Challenge of Human Wellbeing Small Grant](#) brought together researchers from the Slade School of Fine Art and the Eastman Dental Hospital.

The grant contributed to the [face2face project](#) at UCL Hospitals that aimed to show that **images can expand pain dialogue** in the consulting room **to** include aspects of experience frequently omitted using traditional measures, such as **rate your pain on a scale of one to ten**.

Over 1,000 photographic images reflecting and symbolising pain were co-created with pain patients.

From this material a **pilot pack of 54 pain cards** was developed and trialed as a **communication tool in clinical consultations** at UCLH.

Grand Challenges funding supported **non-verbal analysis, linguistic analysis and input from of an art psychotherapist**.

# Lancet Commission on Health and Climate Change

In 2007 academics from across UCL were brought together to address health and climate change.

The result of this initiative was a 2009 report in The Lancet on "[Managing the Health Effects of Climate Change](#)".

The UCL Grand Challenge of Global Health provided funding and staff resources to support this initiative, which then grew into [The Lancet Commission on Health and Climate Change](#).

The Commission brought together more than 45 European and Chinese academics and experts including from UCL, Tsinghua University, Umea University and the University of Exeter.

The work started by the Lancet Commission now continues with [The Lancet Countdown: Tracking Progress on Health and Climate Change](#), which is supported by the Grand Challenge of Global Health.
